As I write this Christmas reflection, Remembrance Day has just been observed and the darkness of a cold November is upon me. In one way, it is difficult to imagine an idyllic Christmas in the midst of dark and dreary November days, but imagining it does help one live through these gloomy days more easily. Most of us have long passed the days where our Christmas ideals are based on the materialism of the perfect gift. Instead, we imagine the perfect setting in which all of our loved-ones might gather.

This year, I tried to get my brothers and my sister to rent a massive cottage with me, so that we could all be together to celebrate the holidays. I imagined all of the cousins playing together in the snow, and then coming in to a warm fire and hot chocolate. I pictured a "monumental" hockey game on the frozen pond. I envisioned everyone laughing and telling stories, and celebrating the awesome feast of the Incarnation. What a Christmas it would be!

I found myself frustrated by the seeming lack of good-will on the part of my relatives, as some of them could not, or would not, oblige my ideal because they had to work over part of the holidays, or because other relatives were involved, or because they could not justify the expense of the rental. How could they not put these other things aside in order to provide me with my ideal!? People make our lives difficult, especially when they do not act and think in the way we imagine they should. It is ironic that my ideals seem to be about people. But really, are they?

One of my most memorable Christmases was my father's last. We were all together for Christmas dinner, but my Dad was not feeling well so he stayed in bed. I remember feeling annoyed with him because he was spoiling the ideal Christmas dinner. To make matters worse, my Mom was concerned and asked us to help my Dad shower. What

kind of Christmas event was this? People were not behaving according to my "ideal". The next day, my father was taken to the hospital; that was the last Christmas he spent at home.

I can say that the almost-comical scene of my two brothers and me trying to get our Dad into the shower is one of the fondest memories I have. His vulnerability allowed us to share a precious moment of real, human contact. His weakness and humility – not the ideals I had ascribed to my Dad – provided us with the opportunity to express our love for him. As imperfect, clumsy and comical as it was, it allowed us to say, "I love you Dad," in a simple and powerful way.

Christmas is God's great expression of His love for us. In our November darkness, in the midst of our imperfections and weaknesses, God comes to be with us, "to pitch His tent among us." His coming to us does not wait for our perfection. He meets us in all our faults and shows us how much we are loved.

May the grace of God's love touch all of us this Christmas, so that we may reflect that grace to all who share their lives with us.

I grew up on the outskirts of town, with a great evergreen forest near our house. Each December, our parents would send my sisters and me to the woods to bring back, before dark, the best Christmas tree we could find. While we looked forward to the search every year, it wasn't easy. You had to tramp through the snow pretty far, hopeful, but not sure, of finding a decent tree. You might encounter a moose, or get lost if you weren't careful.

In many ways, our annual search for a tree reminds me of the Advent season. In both, there is a going into the wilderness – in one, into the natural wild, and in the other, into the wilds of our hearts. In the woods, we are trying to find a balanced and strong evergreen that can last through the cold winter. In Advent, we seek a prayerful and reverent posture to receive the Lord on Christmas, to improve on our failures and imperfections, to recall and to share the good that God has planted in each of us. Searching our hearts during Advent can be a quiet, but challenging, process; like searching for a Christmas tree in a cold and darkening forest.

In both cases, we know on one level that the end result will be a good one, but another part of us is also aching for that good outcome. As much as we know Christmas will eventually come, we still ache for it to arrive, for the relief and joy in the arrival of Jesus, God's incredible gift of His only Son.

When we got the tree back home to our parents, no matter which one we chose, what awaited us was a warm house and a family celebration. No one pointed out any of the tree's flaws, even if it was a "Charlie Brown" tree. In the same way, when Jesus arrives at Christmas time, our hearts are lit up with joy because God gives His love abundantly, regardless of whether we feel we deserve it, whether we feel spiritually "ready" or not.

What I wish for us is an Advent where we can have time for quiet preparation – for a good and prayerful look inside ourselves, asking God to ready our hearts to receive the spirit of Jesus on Christmas. And I hope that we can share the love that God has given us with our loved ones, in the same warm spirit of peace and joy that I felt when we got back from the woods with our tree, those many years ago. A prayerful Advent and a merry Christmas to all!

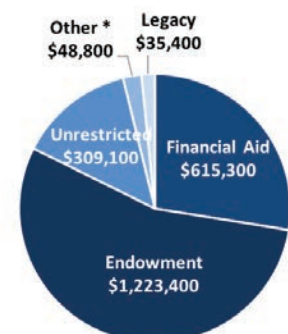

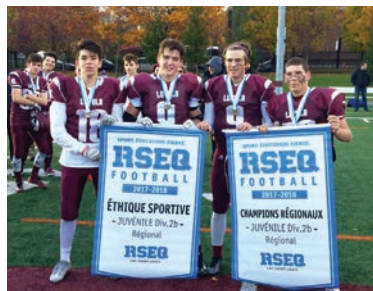

Industrial Arts

Four years ago, *Industrial Arts* was launched as a senior “option” course. The *Introduction to Technology* course (ITT), once taught by Naz Ruscito, was abolished by the government several years ago, and the school recognized that *Industrial Arts* could fill that gap and provide valuable learning opportunities for students to work with their hands and explore different mechanical, technical and design skills.

Initiated and taught by Mr. Michael Elie '97, *Industrial Arts* provides secondary-five students with an introduction to the use of shop equipment and building techniques. Topics in the course include: basic drafting (drawing of diagrams), shop safety,

and construction using various materials, from wood to metal and plastic. *Industrial Arts* also introduces some basic electrical concepts and rudimentary automotive maintenance, from changing car tires, to jump-starting a car whose battery is dead. Over the past four years, projects have included the building of locker shelving, stick racks for our hockey teams, and several picnic tables. These projects have helped students keep their sports equipment organized and enhanced their outdoor space.

Although the basement of the school housed the original workshop for the ITT course, it is now home to our successful Robotics' program. *Industrial Arts* students work with basic hand tools and power tools in the science lab on the second floor.

Looking ahead: Loyola's future and *Ignite*



Loyola is part of an international network of Jesuit schools working toward a shared vision that extends globally to 845 institutions. As partners in the mission of Jesuit education, we build bridges around the globe to exchange information and resources, to reflect, and to discuss best practices and new initiatives. Our shared vision informs and challenges the kind of teaching and learning pursued, the caring relationships experienced both in and out of the classroom, and the values that permeate our school.

In the spring of 2016, having heard of a network of Jesuit schools that was revolutionizing high school education, a small group of Loyola faculty travelled to Barcelona, Spain. What they witnessed was impressive. They found students working collaboratively on real-world problems. They found local community members, businesses and parents, actively engaged in the learning process of students. They found teachers combining their classes to teach cross-curricular concepts simultaneously. They found walls that could open, chairs and desks on wheels, students standing or in motion, carpets on floors, touchscreens and whiteboards throughout. Most important, they found students actively engaged in, and motivated by, the learning process. Encouragingly, student grades and the depth of learning have increased at these schools.

In the Ignatian spirit, this experience spurred a period of reflection and discussion at Loyola. Could our students benefit from a thorough rethinking of our pedagogical practices? If so, what would our program look like? To answer these questions, *Ignite* was created.

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Ignite is a committee of about thirty teachers, administrators and staff, whose goal is to ensure that Loyola remains forward-thinking, while staying true to its mission to form men of conscience, competence, and compassionate commitment.

Inspired by books written about the process in Barcelona, sub-committees were launched to evaluate learning spaces as well as to research best pedagogical practices.

Thanks to the Loyola High School Foundation, four of the classrooms on the third floor (two examples shown here) were renovated, and new, flexible furniture was provided for use in these rooms. A series of pilot projects that puts educational research into action has been launched. As the program is being explored and built, data is collected and analyzed at each step. The school is excited about sharing its plans and, in the coming months, will be asking the wider Loyola community for its input. Please stay tuned!

Wrestling at Loyola

In 1969, when this ancient sport was first introduced at Loyola, interest was minimal. In 1978 a wrestling room was built in the Loyola gym and participation in the sport slowly increased. In 1995 wrestling was added to the roster of sports at the Winter Sports Tournament (re-named the Ed Meagher Sports Tournament in 1996). Since then interest and ability in the sport has grown, culminating in 2017 with Loyola winning the GMAA Wrestling Championship.

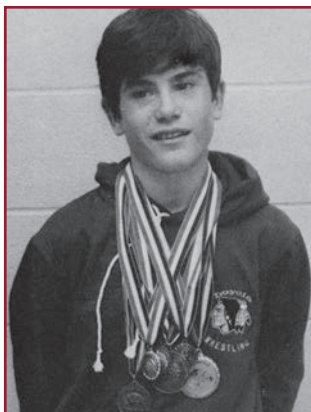

The 1987 wrestling team competed in eleven dual meets as a member of the GMAAA, and a number of tournaments including the Beaconsfield “takedown”, the Omnium de Quebec, the Riverdale Open, and the Scarborough International Invitational.

Most of the members of this year’s team were novices, as far as wrestling is concerned, and the year might be considered as being a rebuilding year. As the season progressed, the talents of the wrestlers began to come to the surface and as a result, a good number of medals were won at the GMAA final (including a Gold for Craig Montour) and at the Provincial Championships, held this year at Massey Vanier in Cowansville. With the excellent coaching of Mike Sullivan, the only thing missing to make Loyola a championship team is wrestlers. Once again, the wrestling team had difficulty recruiting members, and without a larger number of wrestlers, Loyola was unable to field a team with a wrestler in each weight class. 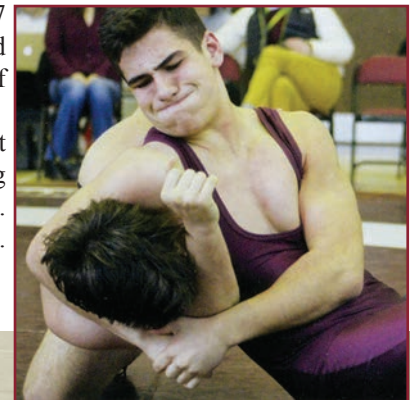


2016-17 Wrestling Champs

The 2016-17 Loyola wrestling team won the GMAA city championship on February 16, 2017 at Kahnawake Survival School. The Warriors completed their first ever perfect season and repeated as GMAA champions. Loyola took home a total of 22 medals, 7 of them gold, in one of the most remarkable wrestling performances in recent years.

Coach Bruno Cyr commented, “When you have quality kids you have a chance. Beyond that, it comes down to everyone doing their jobs as best they can, being accountable for what they bring to the table”. “Our captains were Patrick Greiss and William Matthews, and they were fantastic. Both of them were five year veterans of the wrestling team, so their leadership was very natural. They only had to lead by example and got instant respect from their coaches and teammates.”
